TeenEagle Three

Prompt Example: James Harvey Robinson's enlightening book The Mind in the Making is quoted in How to Win Friends and Influence People. What lessons does this excerpt teach you about positive communication and human psychology?

100% to 75%

- The essay contains between three to five paragraphs, depending on organization.
- The introducing statement is given clearly, and incorporates the full prompt.
- The essay states how many and which reasons the writer will use to back their statement. There should be two reasons.
- Each "reason" is backed up by a supporting sentence, which further explains the reason or gives examples.
- Each "reason" should provide a specific reference from the resource given in the prompt.
- The essay has a conclusion, written differently than the introduction.
- The essay uses sentence adverbs as subordinators/coordinators.
- The essay uses a range of different syntactic patterns and synonyms to avoid repetition.
- The essay is written primarily in third-person. It is written in a formal, academic tone.
- The essay is easily followed, understandable, and has a minimum of spelling or grammatical errors.
- The essay is 200-250 words long.

Robinson's book is quoted as saying "The little word 'my' is the most important one in human affairs, and to reckon with it is the beginning of wisdom." That might seem like a pessimistic view of humans and our minds, but I believe that it is actually an important lesson on communication and psychology. I have two reasons for this opinion.

Firstly, this quote is found in a chapter called A SURE WAY OF MAKING ENEMIES. The idea behind this quote is that insisting on one way of thinking is the only way to lose an argument. Understanding what we care about most can help people understand what we are actually arguing about. That means using or avoiding the word 'my' can make people more understanding communicators.

Secondly, ego and what people care about can stop progress. If someone wants to get better at something, they must be willing to make mistakes and learn from them. Robinson's book also says that people want to keep believing what they already believe, and that they will argue as much as possible to keep it that way. However, if they learn to accept our mistakes and get rid of our ego, they will be able to become better, smarter, or more experienced.

In conclusion, not understanding the strength of our egos can turn us into biased communicators and stop us from learning. This is why I say Robinson teaches us valuable lessons about our psychology.



74% to 50%

- The essay contains a minimum of three paragraphs and a maximum of four, depending on organization.
- The introductory statement includes part of the prompt.
- The essay contains two reasons, although some may not be considered valid/scientific.
- The essay uses examples and supporting sentences after their reasons, although some may not be considered valid/scientific.
- The conclusion is written in the same way as the introduction.
- The essay uses some subordination and coordination.
- The essay incorporates some different sentence patterns and synonyms, but occasionally repeats itself.
- At least half of the essay is written in third-person. It is written in an academic but informal tone.
- There are a few grammatical or spelling mistakes, which do not interfere with comprehension.
- The essay is just under 200 words long.

50% to 25%

- The essay contains a minimum of two paragraphs and a maximum of three, depending on organization.
- The introductory statement only lists the prompt, without providing a direction.
- The essay contains at least one reason which comes from the resource provided, while any others cannot be considered scientific/valid.
- The essay does not use examples or supporting sentences to explain the reasoning.
- The conclusion is not used or is not obviously concluding the essay.
- The essay only uses a few instances of coordination or subordination.
- The essay repeats itself in terms of syntactic patterns, vocabulary, and meaning.
- The essay is written in an overall informal tone.
- The essay is primarily in first-person.
- There are enough grammatical or spelling mistakes that stop complete comprehension of the text.
- The essay is around 150 words long.
